Our Annual meeting was held on a beautifully sunny Saturday, January 24th at the Silverton Senior Center. Those attending listened intently as we reported on our activities for 2014, which included among other things: participating in the Willamette Heritage Invitational Exhibit for the 4th year, finalizing some landscaping around the Museum, participating in Historic Silver Falls Days and the Portland Archives Crawl, hosting the Dime Toss Booth fundraiser at the Homer Davenport Community Festival, applying for and receiving a grant from the Oregon Community Foundation for the construction of

a storage/display case for the recently acquired Homer Davenport cartoons, and, of course, providing on-going assistance with research requests from the community

We reviewed the Society's budget, reelected board Member Fred Parkinson, and added new Board Member Gus Frederick and new volunteer curator, Judy Lowery. Volunteer of the year, Fred Parkinson was recognized and an update of the progress of the War Memorial Plaza, Silverton's Fallen Heroes project was provided by SCHS President Norm English.

The membership was then treated to a

presentation by Gus Frederick on the history of the Historical Society, the Museum and the Depot. And of course refreshments followed.

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# From the President...

When I last reported in this column on the progress of fundraising efforts for the War Memorial Plaza-Silverton's Fallen Heroes, we were about \$20,000 shy of our goal. A lot has happened in those few short months in helping us move forward with the project.



Because the response to our call for donations has been very good over these past four months, I can now report to you that the construction part of the project is fully funded, what with donations and grants that we have received or that have been approved. On behalf of the War Memorial Committee, we would like to thank all the Silverton Country Historical Society members and others who helped us fund this project.



We will very soon be purchasing several major items needed for the plaza and donating them to the City of Silverton so they are there and ready to go when needed. The city is in the process of establishing their dedicated spending account and setting up the construction details so that groundbreaking can occur, perhaps as early as the latter part of April. And the actual construction would then continue throughout the summer months with a target for completion in the fall.

Additional fundraising is still ongoing for the purpose of paying for any contingency items that still need to be covered and for ongoing maintenance once the project is complete,

so if you have not yet donated to this project or would like to help with these items, please consider sending a check soon. And thanks to all of you who have already contributed to this wonderful project to honor Silverton's Fallen Heroes.

On another note, since we have once again opened the museum to visitors for the season, and since we have made a lot of revisions to our display, revamping several of the dedicated rooms into Silverton History, Red Sox, and Ladies Bedroom displays, even more than ever I can now say, "Come and see what we've done to the place." Keep us in mind for a visit real soon, and let me say here how thankful I am for our volunteers who have put all this together for folks to enjoy. ## A Long Time Coming.....

If you have ever viewed a photograph of historic Silverton, it was most likely taken by Silverton's foremost commercial photographer, June D. Drake. But Drake was not only an eminent photographer; he was a historian, a chronicler of the life and times of a community, a strong advocate for the preservation of nature, and a collector of mementos from all over the world.



Drake's photographs display an intense devotion to his home town and to the neighboring small towns. They cover not portraits alone, but the whole story of the town and surrounding countryside: its factories, mills, farms, fairs, fire, floods, parades, picnics, buildings, homes, roads, store interiors, shops, stables—regular life in the city. His images record not only the activities of the town but also the entire working life of June Drake and his studio.

However, when Drake was asked what he considered his greatest achievement, he replied without hesitation, "Silver Falls State Park." As early as 1900, Drake began photographing the Falls—he hired men to cut pathways so he could better document and preserve their spectacular beauty. He created publications advertis-

ing the splendor of the area and even purchased several hundred acres himself in order to help secure the land. His untiring efforts were instrumental in protecting the area from logging and helped to convince legislators to create a state park. In July of 1933, the area was opened to the public and dedicated as Silver Falls State Park. Drake's name still appears on landmarks in the area as recognition of his perseverance.

Drake gradually retired from photography in the late 1950's. He died in 1969 and is buried in Silverton Cemetery. But until recently, if you tried to find the gravesite of this outstanding Silverton citizen, you were unsuccessful. The grave marker of his father and mother, Charles and Fannie Drake, is quite prominent, and a search of cemetery records indicate that June and his wife Eleanor are buried in the same plot ....but there was no visible maker showing this. That is—until last month.

June's granddaughter, Margo Drake Walker of Portland, had earlier asked us for help in finding her grandfather's grave. Disappointed by the fact that after all these years, there was nothing honoring the memory of this outstanding man, she decided to remedy the situation. Using the services of Pete Martinez, of Willamette Memorials, she had June and Eleanor's names added to the large existing grave marker. The photo below on the left displays the addition. It's a little hard to read as it is so new, but at last we can identify that this is indeed June Drake's resting place. And on the reverse side of the marker, as you may also be able to see in the center photograph below, is recognition of June Drake's proudest accomplishment......


individuals, \$1,000 for couples filing jointly, and \$2,500 for corporations. A tax credit reduces what you owe the State of Oregon. It is a much greater savings than a deduction, which only reduces the income on which you are taxed, and your contribution to Oregon's cultural entities is essentially doubled.
