After the Life of Vesper Geer By Michael Turner 16 minutes, 2019


In 2011, director Michael Turner started *The Life of Vesper Geer*, a biographic documentary about a local woman that would premiere on Oregon Public Broadcasting in 2013 and that The Oregonian called "Rich for the eyes, ears, and memory."

While creating the film, Turner stumbled upon a secret that Vesper took to her grave, and decided not to include it in Vesper's film. This secret took on a life of it's own, and is the subject of a new short film called "After the Life of Vesper Geer." It's a story about how the past is not frozen in time, but continues to touch our lives in the present.

Michael Turner is a past Oregon Media Arts Fellow. His films have shown at cinemas and universities around the world and have been translated into many different languages. He lives in Scotts Mills with his wife and two-year-old daughter.

Thankfully, all of our volunteers do that every day for Silverton history and this year I am deeply grateful for our volunteers who have given over 1,100 hours of work for that purpose.
