The Silver Falls Timber Company's big saw mill started the sawing season Wednesday morning with plenty of men on hand for successful operation. With the exception of three or four all of the mill positions are filled by men who have been with company previously.

Fine weather in the logging camps has given the loggers an opportunity to get logs out rapidly. The mill pond is estimated to be holding over 8,000,000 feet of logs. The date set for the resumption of sawing had been planned for March 1st but the logs were piling up so fast that it was either necessary to start the mill earlier or switch the workers in the logging camps.

### Business Men May Form Building Society.

A movement was put in motion at a special meeting of the Silverton Community Club Wednesday evening for the organization of a company of business men to try and overcome the shortage of homes in Silverton.

It was pointed out that family after family comes to this city with the intention of making their home here but are compelled to go away because of the fact that they cannot find a place to house their families.

Fifty homes were built in Silverton last year and fifty more con'. be filled right now were they available.

The meeting was well attended and by a rising vote the idea of forming a local building company was given hearty approval.

An effort will be made to organize the company with a \$50.000 capitalization. By motion the cnair was empowered to appoint a committee of five to canvas the business men of the city to ascertain what portion of the \$50.000 can be subscribed for this purpose. Those selected to do the interviewing are Julius Alm, Geo. W. Hubbs, Wm. A. Zosel Geo. Steelhammer and Elmer Olsen. Within a few days these gentlemen will be ready to report back to the Club the success they meet with.

The idea of the movement is for the company to build the houses and be able to sell them to families for a payment down and so much per month.

some things really don't change much in 100 years. In the lower left hand corner there is this: Announcement! We have arranged with the American Relief Administration to issue Food Drafts payable in the following countries: GRE-MANY; AUSTRIA; POLAND; HUNGARY; AND CZECHOSLOVAKIA. Since this is post World War I these countries are the hardest hit by the effects of the war and in need of the most relief. The ad was taken out by the Coolidge and McClaine Bank.








Judy, as usual, working diligently on our display at Mission Mill. The final result is appreciated by Fred. We hope you will go see this and the other displays.

Several excerpts from the writings of Silverton's own Timothy W. Davenport are included in the recent Winter issue of the Oregon Historical Quarterly's special issue on White Supremacy and Resistance. T.W. became interested in anti-slavery politics after settling in the area in 1852. He was also a contributor to the magazine on the subject in the early 1900's.

Davenport was active in Silverton's social scene, joining other prominent locals to form the Silverton Liberal Union. The organization was a precursor to the Oregon State Secular Union, which became a major voice of the so-called free-thought movement in Oregon during the late nineteenth century.

In recognition of this election year, our main display case in the living room is once again being graced by our collection of First Lady dolls, lovingly styled and dressed by long time Silverton resident, Mary Ruhl Dodds. The consummate homemaker, she is remembered by her family as "always working on something." We are fortunate to have these amazing examples of her handiwork. The collection, which was donated to the Museum in 1998, includes all the First Ladies, and acting First ladies, from Martha Washington up to Hilary Clinton. We would love to bring the collection up to date but as yet we have not had any takers.

In the early days of the United States republic, there was no generally accepted title for the wife of the President. Many early first ladies expressed their own preference for how they were addressed, including the use of such titles as "Lady," "Mrs. President," "Mrs. Presidentress" and "Queen," as in the case of Dolley Madison.

Supposedly, Harriet Lane, niece of President James Buchanan, was the first woman to be called First Lady in the press. The phrase appeared in Frank Leslie's Illustrated Monthly in 1860, when he wrote, "The Lady of the White House, and by courtesy, the First Lady of the Land."

The title actually first gained nationwide recognition in 1877, when Mary C. Ames wrote an article in the New York City newspaper <u>The Independent</u> describing the inauguration of President Rutherford B. Hayes. She used the term to describe his wife, Lucy Webb Hayes. Mrs. Hayes was a tremendously popular first lady, and the frequent reporting on her activities helped spread use of the term outside Washington. After that the term First Lady was applied retroactively to all predecessors.
